This photograph was probably taken shortly before the building was completed, since the sign across the front of the building above the doors has not been lettered yet. A later photo of the building, which is of poor quality so it could not be reproduced, has what looks like the following lettering on the front of the building: "A. Hanson Blacksmithing and Wagon Work & Horseshoeing a Specialty."

A. Hanson Blacksmith and Wagon Shop

Adolph Hanson was a blacksmith and wagon maker whose blacksmith shop was located on North Main Street in Iola. In the 1897-1898 edition of *Polks Wisconsin State Gazeteer*, Adolph Hanson is listed as "Hanson, Adolph, Blacksmith." A second person listed in the same directory as a blacksmith was "Hanson, C. E., Blacksmith and Wagonmaker." In the 1895-1896 *Gazeteer* there is also a listing of "Hanson & Johnson Bros., Blacksmiths", but it is unknown which Hanson it was.

The original building, a wood structure probably built around 1896 or 1897, was destroyed by fire in 1903. A story printed in the Iola Herald on July 23, 1903, had the headline, "Hanson's Shop Burned" with the following story line: "About 10:15 this afternoon fire was discovered in A. Hanson's blacksmith shop and before it could be checked had completely destroyed the building. Mr. Hanson's loss will practically be the building as no material damage was done to the stock. For a time it looked as though Gullikson Bros.

Hardware would also be consumed by the flames, but heroic work by the fire department and others saved the structure." The Gullikson Bros. Hardware was later sold and became Olson Hardware; today that building is occupied by Iola Heating & Cooling Inc. at 180 N. Main Street.

Adolph Hanson immediately rebuilt his business as a large two story brick building to house the Hanson Blacksmith Shop and Buggy

President's Corner

Some great things have happened for the Iola Historical Society the first six months of 2008. I would like to take this opportunity to review some of them with you. In January, we were fortunate enough to receive funding from Chet Krause to purchase the building located across the street from our Iola Historical Village at 222 Depot Street (Hawke Excavating). In April, Chet once again gifted the Society with another property which is located at 210 Depot Street (Lashua Excavating). In return, Chet was given a life time lease on 222 Depot Street where he will display his jeep and automobile collection. He has since had the building remodeled by adding insulation, including new insulated overhead doors, new interior steel walls, rewiring and new lighting fixtures, and a restroom has been added. Then to top all that off, he will have the parking lot paved for us!

Presently we are seeking funding to remodel the ex-Lashua property so we can eventually create a museum to exhibit our artifacts. In addition, our office will also be located there. Eventually the file cabinets, documents, photographs, artifacts and other items not related to the buildings they are currently in will be moved there. This will allow us to display only those items relating to the Fire House, Depot, School House, Helvetia Town Hall, and the Log Cabin to be on display in those buildings.

Shop. The following story appeared in the Iola Herald on September 3, 1903: "A. Hanson's new shop will be one of the most convenient buildings in town when completed. It will be two stories high; the ground floor to be used for blacksmithing and horse shoeing, and the second floor for wagon-shop and carpenter work."

On the back of the photograph is a note refering to "Little George Taylor's Dray." This is in reference to the wagon at the extreme right edge of the photograph. You can see an unidentified young boy sitting up front on the driver's seat of the wagon. George Taylor had this wagon and a team of horses and delivery service that operated under

the identity: "George Taylor & Dray Line."

The building was later home to at least three Ford Dealerships one owned by Tom Solverson of Waupaca and another by F. R. Meiklejohn. Lenwick (Len) Hoyord, along with a partner, had a Ford dealership in the 1930s and after a short period of time Len became sole owner of the dealership. In 1949 Len switched to a Chevrolet dealership when Chevrolet became "Car of the Year" and Ford Motor Company dictated that all small Ford Dealerships had to stock parts the same as large dealerships, which many smaller dealers could not afford.

Len Hoyord sold Chevrolets until

circa 1966-1967 when he dropped the dealership. In 1968 the building

was sold at auction to an individual who remodeled the building and rented out the front of the building to the United States Postal Service. A snowmobile dealership was located in the back part of the building. Today, the major part, 190 North Main St., is occupied by the Iola Post Office. Korrin's Groom Room, a dog grooming service, is located in the smaller part at 188 N. Main Street.

building. Adolph and Carrie were Charles Thompson's Great Grandfather and Great Grandmother, and Luella was his Grandmother. Luella married Julian (Palmer) Wesley on August 18, 1920 at Big Falls, Wisconsin.

We would also like to thank Tom Hoyord for the information about his father Lenwick Hoyord, who for many years owned and operated the Ford and Chevrolet dealerships in the building

In addition to the normal food venue, a Whatzit Day was included in the day's festivities. This event was organized by IHS member Joel Edler, a local antique dealer and numismatist. There were experts from the collectible fields of automobiles, militaria, records, sports memorabilia, numismatics, comic books, and general antiques. People

brought in a wide assortment of items to determine their value. One of the more interesting collectibles of the day was a Hopalong Cassidy revolving night lamp which has a catalog value of \$650.

Society docents were kept busy explaining to visitors about our historic buildings, and the artifacts displayed within them. People came from as far away as Oshkosh and Merrill to enjoy the food and tours of our village.
