



Doctor George Dale, who was originally from England, came to Iola in 1880 with his wife Sarah. Sarah died in 1881 and is buried at Riverside Cemetery in Iola. Dr. Dale later married Karen Sether.

Dr. George Dale had his doctor's office on the second floor of his drug

and sanitarium on the east side of the 100 block of South Washington Street, now named Chet Krause Drive. It was near the center of the block where the Iola Living Assistance nursing home is located today.

In the book *A History of Iola*,

for 20 years and died at the age of 57. That would have made him three years old when he started practicing medicine in Chicago!

His new hospital was built for treating those cancers and tumors that he had studied earlier. Dr. Dale named his new hospital the "Iola Cancer and Tumor Sanitarium." Contemporary news items of the time reported: "Dr. Dale is quick to detect such cases and honestly expresses his opinion when it seems to be beyond his skills." He also traveled hundreds of miles by either horse and buggy or train to administer his course of treatment, which took from three weeks to three months.

Dr. George Dale was elected Iola's first village president in 1892 when the Village of Iola was incorporated. Most of the early village board meetings were held in Dr. Dale's Drug Store or the I.O.O.F Hall.

In the April election of 1893, O. G. Frogner replaced Dr. Dale as village president. At a meeting of the village board it was moved by Frogner and seconded by T. Thompson and unanimously approved, "To notify Dr. George

store, which was located on the southeast corner of Main Street and State Street where he did his own compounding of medicines. In an attached smaller building on the south side of the drug store he operated a liquor store.

In 1887, Dr. George Dale built a 50-ft. by 180-ft. private hospital

author Malcolm Rosholt stated that Dr. Dale was a physician and surgeon in Chicago where he studied cancers and tumors for 34 years before coming to Iola. Thirty-four years would be inaccurate because Dr. Dale practiced medicine in Iola

Dale to stop selling liquor to minors, persons under the influence of liquor and habitual drunkards, also by the drink." A month later, on a motion by Clarence Cleaves and seconded by T. Thompson it was moved that part of the minutes relating to Dr. Dale

be stricken from the journal, the motion lost.

Dr. Dale advertised his new cancer sanitarium throughout the Midwest through newspapers, magazines and posters like the one shown. The beautiful and very eye-catching poster shown has Dr. Dale's specific advertising overprinted on a stock color lithograph. The poster advertises "cancers and tumors cured without the use of a knife." It also advertises to send a two-cent postage stamp for a book of testimonials, presumably from successfully treated patients.

The following is an advertisement that Dr. Dale placed in a magazine in 1898. The ad was 2" by 3" and stated the following. "Are you suffering with a cancer tumor or malignant growth of any kind? The **Iola Sanitarium**, Iola, Wis. is an institution thoroughly equipped for the treatment of these diseases. The Sanitarium is under the personal supervision of **Geo Dale, M.D.**, a physician who has made the treatment and cure of cancer

a life work. The sanitarium has been established and successfully conducted for fifteen years and in that time has cured hundreds of cases from all

parts of the United States.

No Knife, caustic or plaster.

We never fail to affect a permanent cure where conditions are at all favorable.

For references address **Geo Dale, M. D.**, Iola, Wis.

In that ad there are some misleading or at least exaggerated statements. He

states that the sanitarium has been in operation for 15 years; however the sanitarium was built only 11 years before the ad was placed. It also states the sanitarium has cured hundreds of cases, which may be a little overstated.

Dr. Dale also promoted his sanitarium in the local *Iola Herald* newspaper with a news release titled "Sanitarium Siftings" using names of patients and visitors. There were several such ads each week. Here are just a few to get an idea of what was presented.

On July 28, 1898, "Mrs. George Ailard of Green Bay arrived at the



Sanitarium Wednesday morning to visit her sister Miss Meisler of Crystal Falls, Michigan, who is being treated for cancer." – "Mrs. Ada Kindler of Menominee, Michigan returned to her home after two days stay at the Sanitarium, as the doctor told her that he could do nothing for her." – Mr. Davies of Pickens, Wisconsin, spent Sunday at the Sanitarium. He consulted Dr. George Dale in regard to a cancer in his jaw and neck, but doctor could give him no encouragement for a cure and advised him to return to his home, which he did."

On September 1, 1898 one of the "Siftings" stated, "The doctor returned from Minneapolis, Minnesota and Menominee, Wisconsin, Saturday morning where he had been on business for the Sanitarium. During his absence he saw several who had been treated at the Iola Sanitarium, and found them entirely well."

In the September 29, 1898 issue of the *Iola Herald* the following "Siftings" are two of the five printed. "Adolph Warner of Seymour was at the Sanitarium last Friday for



treatment."

In some of Dr. Dale's advertisements in the *Iola Herald*, he refers to the drug store by the name of "Dale's Drug Store" and other times as "Dale's Sanitarium Drug Store."

Dr. Dale's Cancer Sanitarium won national renown for Iola, but it had a relatively short life as a medical institution. After the arrival of Dr. T. E. Loope in 1898 and Dr. John H. Lee in 1901, references

Consultation with the doctor in regards to a cancer on the lip. He is expected to return the latter part of this week for treatment." – "Mrs. Rolwand returned to her home in Helvetia on Friday after a brief stay at the Sanitarium." These are just a few of the many "Siftings" printed in the newspaper each week.

The sanitarium was also used as a private hospital, as reported in an October 13, 1898 "Siftings". "A little boy by the name of Wagner of Union recently fractured his left arm and came to the Sanitarium for

to the sanitarium are difficult to find. If Dr. Dale's Sanitarium was so successful, why did it close? Also notable was that many of the patients at the sanitarium were sent home because he could not help them, and it seemed like the largest number of patients that were cured were never really seen in Iola. These give rise to skepticism of his practice, but I will leave that conclusion up to the readers of this story.

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CANCER SANITARIUM

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The sanitarium structure was eventually converted into a rooming house and later a multi-dwelling building known as the McKay House. Later it became a hotel known as the Park Lawn Hotel. The structure was purchased in 1961 by the Iola Hospital Association and the structure was razed to make room for a new convalescent home that was built by the Iola Hospital Association and run jointly with the hospital.
