Dr. George Dale's Cancer Sanitarium "Cured" Cancers "Without the Knife"

One of Iola's renowned late 19th century citizens was Dr. George Dale, whose claim to honor was cancers and tumors treatment capabilities, "without the use of the knife," as proclaimed on the tradesman cards used to promote his trade. He gained national recognition for his innovative treatments of these maladies. Testimonials to his accomplishments recorded by those

he treated were many and varied, of origins far and wide.

Born in 1844 of English parentage, George Thomas and Sarah Parrish Dale, Dr. Dale was 36 years old when he moved to Iola in 1880 from Chicago, where he had studied

treatment of cancers and tumors. He built and established practice in a building dedicated to medical purposes, still standing in the southeast quadrant of the State and Main streets intersection, establishing his office on the second floor; installing the pharmacy practice of J.C. Lang (1893-1910) on the first floor, whom he had enlisted as Iola's first pharmacist.

In 1887, Dr. Dale also built a 50 x 180-foot private hospital and sanitarium structure mid-block on the east side of south Washington Street (now Chet Krause Drive), where he established the Iola Cancer and Tumors Sanitarium, a building that stood into the 1960s. It enjoyed a relatively short life as a medical facility, with references to the Cancer Sanitarium slowly disappearing around 1900 following the arrival of fellow medical practitioners Drs. T.E. Loope (1898-1938) and J. H. Lee (1901-1920).

The imposing Washington Street structure was closed down and sold for \$5,000 by Dr. Dale in 1900. He passed away on April 24, 1901, at the age of 57. The structure was subsequently operated by various owners over many years, first operating as the Park Lawn Hotel, then as a rooming house and ultimately as the multi-dwelling McKay House, before passing to the Iola Hospital Association and being razed as the site for building a convalescent home attached to the Iola Hospital. The State and Main Street structure hosted many businesses over the century that followed Dr. Dale's passing.

Dr. Dale was elected as the first president of the Village of Iola, following its 1892 incorporation. That was on the bright side of his contributions to the community, but there was also a dark side to his relationship. Following his service as village president, the village board found occasion to pass a motion to "notify Dr. Geo. Dale to stop selling liquor to minors, persons under the influence of liquor, and habitual drunkards, also by the drink." Starting in 1894, the village began requiring a license, for those engaged in the selling of liquor.

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Threshing Crew ... Plus Two!

At least 19 laborers are captured in this vintage threshing scene . . . three with grain sacks in hand, among a group fronting the threshing machine, along with two ladies who would have been tasked with the chores of preparing lunch and fetching water for the crew. Note there are four men atop the unthreshed stack of grain behind the threshing machine on the left, with one manning the steam traction engine unit on the right . . . another in the center holds a pair of horses, with the ladies being nearby to his immediate left . . . bisected them is a long leather drive belt from steam engine that powers the threshing machine that fronts the grain stack.

This was a typical fall scene on farms throughout the Midwest from roughly1885 to around 1914. These steam engines were often cooperatively owned by multiple local farmers, or by a threshing contractor who moved through an area from farm to farm.

Providing anything resembling a definitive response to the where, when and who of this proto may prove especially challenging. As it comes from our archive, we're certain this picture is of Iola area origins. Unfortunately, there are no prominent distinguishing physical or manmade characteristics present to facilitate the exercise of establishing a location. Perhaps there is a sleuth out there, however, who might be able to discern enough detail to reasonably speculate on the origins of the threshing machine and the steam engine. Let us know any certainties or thoughts you might be able to offer.

The scene captured by an intrepid photographer, as published in the Summer 2024 issue of the *Window*, is believed to date from the late 1950s. The shop was located on the east side of South Main Street at that time. Longtime editor/publisher proprietor Firman Cooper, pipe in hand and decked out in his printer's apron, along with two of his steadfast employees. They are Dolores (Dolly) (Weinman) Hoffman, at the Linotype keyboard, with Vernice (Hoffman) Gjertson standing behind. Dolores was married to Laverne Hoffman; Vernice's husband was Clarence Gjertson.

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
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Selected Yesteryear Highlights from the Iola Herald


November 3, 1898: J. & C. Wipf have purchased a 60-horse-power engine from Frogner Bros. to furnish power for their grist mill and saw mill. A solid stone engine house in process of construction between the two mills.

September 14, 1899: Street commissioner H. Taylor is butting down the hill on the north side of the bridge and hauling it on the south side, raising and grading Main Street about a foot at that point to Waupaca Street (now Depot Street).

September 28, 1899: The railroad track to the Iola Mills were laid this week, and now the cars reach the mill which is a great convenience to load and unload shipments made by them.

October 19, 1899: The Iola Mills will soon be lighted by electricity. They have bought a dynamo and will place it in the mill which will give them good light and the first of its kind in Iola.

May 10, 1900: The Wipf company shipped three carloads of ship timber last Saturday.



This 60-horse-power steam engine acquired from Frogner Bros., installed at the Iola Mills in late 1898, providing power for their grist and sawmills, was housed in a stone engine house built between the two mills. The walls of this structure still stand between the mill and the dam.



A boxcar spotted at the Iola Mills by the Iola & Northern Railroad rests upon the tracked trestle crossing the South Branch of the Little Wolf River that was installed in September 1899. The tracks and trestle have long since been removed.

July 12, 1900: The J. & C. Wipf Lumber Co. are loading several cars of bridge timber this week for the G. B. & W. Ry.

March 7, 1901: A visit to Iola is a surprise to people who supposed logging was a thing of the past – a more logs are banked here this winter than ever was before at any time in the history of the village, besides there are thousands of ties and cedar posts and poles at the depot awaiting shipment.

April 25, 1901: A band of Indians are camping near the mill-pond (Indian Point) as usual at this time of year.

July 3, 1902: Another old landmark is disappearing. The old steam shingle mill, known for years by the title "The Steam Mill," is being torn down.

December 28, 1905: Iola, as a business place, is known among the traveling fraternity as the "big little town of Wisconsin." The term is not misapplied as you can see if you but watch the quantity of freight that arrives at and departs from this station. The number of traveling men is also another item of testimony.

January 11, 1906: At an early hour this morning Walter Zweck, head miller for J. & C. Wipf, discovered that a serious break had occurred in the dam . . . carrying away an enormous quantity of water, which completely floods the rive valley from here to Scandinavia, making it appear as one immense lake.

August 14, 1930: A new diving stand was constructed at the bathing beach at the local mill-pond the latter part of the past week. The new stand is equipped with two spring-boards. The project was engineered by Frederick Wipf of the J. & C. Wipf company and construction work was accomplished by a bunch of enthusiastic kids.
